Behave on the Bus!

When riding in a school bus, Washington Township students are responsible for their behavior. This is such an important message to our children because behavior could affect the safe operation of the bus. Misbehavior could result in the bus driver becoming distracted, which could endanger the lives of all students being transported.

It is important that parents explain the importance of appropriate behavior when riding on the school bus. Please communicate your expectations to your child(ren) to promote self-regulation and compliance of bus rules.

The primary responsibility of the bus driver is to safely transport the students to and from school. While transporting students, the driver also has the responsibility of maintaining discipline on the bus. Therefore, the driver will report any behavior infractions to the proper authority and disciplinary action will be taken in accordance with the established guidelines.

Bus Rules:

- Follow directions the first time they are given;
- Sit in the assigned seat, facing forward with feet on the floor;
- Swearing or loud, obnoxious behavior will not be tolerated;
- No eating or drinking on the bus;
- Students should not litter, write on or damage the bus or anyone else's property in any way; and
- Students are not allowed to get off the bus at any place other than their home without written permission from their parent/ guardian, along with the Principal's signature.

Counselor's Corner — April 2014

I was speaking with two students this week and one said to the other, who was feeling sad, "Don't worry as soon as you get home we can face-time and talk; you'll feel better." Mind you, the girls were sitting face to face with each other at that moment and had the opportunity to talk in a safe environment. This brings me to an important reminder: Try to assure that your child is comfortable with real world social skills before they interact excessively in an on-line environment. There is a sense of make believe, a false sense of security and a detachment from reality that exists with technology. That feeling of anonymity is often at the heart of inappropriate use of technology that can lead to cyberbullying.

The focus of character education this month will focus on cyberbullying and the use of technology. Inappropriate use of technology was once a predominantly middle or high school phenomena. However, this is increasingly an issue with our younger population. Texts, facebook, tweets, skype, and facetime are how our children connect and socialize. As our children get older, their social lives get more complicated and their access to technology and social media increase. It is our mutual responsibility to education our children and encourage responsible, respectful, safe behavior that allows our children to reap the benefits from technology while curbing on-line misuse.

Please share these helpful tips regarding 'healthy" use of technology with your family:

- Elementary age children should all have their electronic use monitored. See what is being posted, check messages, limit usage time. This is the time to teach proper use of technology. You didn't ignore teaching them basic manners like 'please' and 'thank you' and this is equally as vital.
- Do not share passwords with friends. This is a life lesson passwords are private (yes, they should share their password with you!)
- "Chat rooms" are often a part of on-line games (Xbox Live, etc.). This interaction can get out of control really fast; be wary of communication with anyone that your child does not know (in a face to face, personal friend way), when they are playing on-line games.
- All private information can be made public quickly and easily; digital footprints are real. Everything is retrievable. Once something is deleted... it is NOT really gone.
- There are clear and real consequences social, punitive, legal parenthesis xxxxxxxxxxfor cyberbully-ing or any behavior considered harassing that occurs on line.
- Did you know that innocent bystanders CAN be considered perpetrators if they pass on inappropriate emails, texts or photos?
- Be a safe haven for your child. Let them know that they can speak with you if they feel uncomfortable about something they have seen or read (or posted) on-line.

Each year I find that this topic is more and more relevant. One of the greatest challenges with technology is that it is ever present in our lives. We are reachable 24/7. This also means that our children are reachable at all hours of the day and night, in their rooms, at their friends, on holidays and on

weekends. their social circles are no longer limited to school hours and 'play dates.'

With this in mind, I am happy to help support the lesson that technology is a tool that must be used safely and responsibly. If you wouldn't say something to someone's face then it shouldn't be posted, texted or tweeted. Be respectful and keep it positive!




Magic of Flight Competition
