










# Washington Township Schools "Making a Difference"

### Honeywell Instant Alert

With the winter season upon us, the Washington Township School District may have the need to forward eblast notifications for delayed openings, school closings or early dismissals. Our Honeywell reports indicate that there are several parent families not receiving our eblast notifications.

If you are not receiving our alerts please go to the parent login page found on district web site under "Parents" and choose **Honeywell Instant Alert Log-in**.

Once logged in, there is a page where you can determine which type of alert you wish to receive and to what device or account (cell phone, home phone, text message, and / or email). This page simulates a table where you can place check marks after the contact mode. If you have forgotten your username or password, please click on the link "Forgot Username/Password." Honeywell will email you the information needed. If you have any difficulties, please contact your child's main office and school personnel will assist you with the web site.

# Preparing for PARCC

PARCC Assessments will be given to students in grades 3 -6 in March and May of 2015 (PARCC Assessments replace NJASK tests). Testing dates are still be finalized but our anticipated testing dates are listed below. Testing is scheduled to take place in the morning.

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March - PARCC 9^{th} - 13^{th} - 3^{rd} \text{ and } 4^{th} \text{ grade testing} 16^{th} - 20^{th} - 5^{th} \text{ and } 6^{th} \text{ grade testing} May - PARCC 11^{th} - 13^{th} - 3^{rd} \text{ and } 4^{th} \text{ grade testing} 18^{th} - 20^{th} - 5^{th} \text{ grade testing} 18^{th} - 21^{st} - 6^{th} \text{ grade testing}
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About PARCC. The Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers (PARCC) represents a fundamental shift in how we think about testing, state to state. PARCC is based on the core belief that assessment should not be a process to penalize educators and districts, but rather a tool for enhancing teaching and learning. The PARCC assessments in English Language Arts (ELA/Literacy) and Mathematics are carefully crafted to give teachers, schools, students and parents better and more useful information on how we're preparing our kids for careers and college — and life.

Traditional Assessments vs. PARCC. PARCC assessments are tests worth taking and are the type of new generation assessment that teachers have requested for years. They include texts worth reading and problems worth solving.

- In ELA/literacy, the PARCC assessments will look much deeper at student writing abilities and critical-thinking skills, for example. In some instances, states will be adding a writing component that isn't currently part of their state tests.
- In math, students will have to solve complex problems, show their work, and demonstrate how they solved the problem. Unlike pencil-and-paper bubble tests, these new assessments will more closely resemble high-quality classroom work. PARCC will measure what children are learning, in a more meaningful way.
- PARCC's estimated testing time is reasonable and reflects the shift from traditional multiple choice tests to performance-based assessments. The new assessments are designed to measure the full range of knowledge and skills students need to be career and college ready or on track toward that goal, through performance based tasks. The assessments will be innovative in design and more engaging for students.
- PARCC assessments will measure the full range of student performance, including the performance of high- and low-achieving students. Too often, now, tests don't adequately measure the skills and knowledge of students working significantly beyond or below their grade level. The new assessments will add additional time for testing in some states; however, they will produce a clearer and more accurate picture of student achievement.

#### Dictionaries Delivered

"Rotarians are people who like to help people." That is one of the main ideas that Port Colden's third graders acquired when the Washington Rotary came to visit on Nov. 5th. From their presentation, students learned the Rotary is a service organization of men and women who give of their time to make their communities and the world community a better place. The Washington Rotary Club gives to others throughout the year through programs that contribute to the improvement of the local community. Some of their projects are:

- ~ The Street Signs Project Each year, Rotarians replace any needed street signs with larger, reflective signs to assist emergency personnel in all of Washington. The signs are white for the Borough and blue for the Township. Each sign has a Rotary symbol on it.
- ~ National Night Out The Rotary helps people by serving hot dogs and hamburgers to the community during this annual police event. Rotarians now assist our local police department as they serve over 800 meals.
- ~ Worldwide Projects Rotarians also find time to get involved with helping people throughout the world. Rotary International is the leading member of Global Polio Eradication. Rotarians have contributed over \$600 million to this cause alone.
- ~For our Borough and Township Police, our local rotary raised money to fill each police car with audio and visual car cameras.
- ~For our Third Grade Students: The Dictionary Project A dream came true in 1995 for a South Carolina principal who was a Rotarian. He wanted to provide 3rd grade students nationwide with a new dictionary. Every Rotary Club in New Jersey now participates. Our Washington Rotary distributes nearly 700 dictionaries to nearby schools annually. To date, 90,000 dictionaries were given to Garden State 3rd graders. Overall, 15 million students have benefited from this simple idea started by one Rotarian.

Port Colden students were extremely excited when presented with their brand new dictionaries to take home. Children could not put them down throughout the day because they were so eager to read about so many new things! This dictionary not only provides new words and definitions, but it has a copy of the Declaration of Independence, the alphabet in sign language, Constellations, the longest word (which is over 1,000 letters and is the name of a chemical) and a list of all the presidents!

Thank you Rotarians, for helping our students become better readers, writers and spellers with this beautiful dictionary gift!
