Honeywell Instant Alert



Given recent weather conditions, the Washington Township School District will have the need to forward e-blast notifications for delayed openings, school closings or early dismissals.

If you are not receiving our alerts, please go to the parent login page found on our district web site under "Parents" and choose **Honeywell Instant Alert Login**.

Once logged in, there is a page where you can determine which type of alert you wish to receive and to what device or account (cell phone, home phone, text message, and / or email). This page simulates a table where you can place check marks after the contact mode.

If you have forgotten your username or password, please click on the link "Forgot Username/Password." Honeywell will email you the information needed.

If you have any difficulties, please contact your child's main office and school personnel will assist you with the web site.

Important Immunization Reminder — For Preschool/Pre-K Parents

All children attending a Preschool or Child Care program in the state of NJ, **must annually receive one dose of influenza vaccine between September 1 and December 31 of each year.**

Please provide documented proof of your child having received this vaccine **so that your child may remain in school in January 2014.**

Vaccination Reminder!

Grade 5 Parents - Remember all students entering 6th grade next year **must receive one dose of Tdap and one dose of Meningococcal vaccines** before school starts. Required documentation of your child having received these vaccines **MUST** be sent to the Health Office **PRIOR** to school starting next September.

Don't wait until summer time when doctor's offices are booked and busy! **Documentation of these vaccines can be sent in any time during this current school year.** If your child is already 11 years old or turns 11 during the school year, consider having them receive these vaccinations early and send in documentation **at that time.**

Counselor's Corner

Hip Hip Hooray for the New Year 2014! I am always awed by the passing of time. I take some precious moments at the dawn of each New Year to reflect on the past 12 months that passed, in a blink, I must add. I am so thankful that my year was full of positive milestones including my oldest, Kyle, attending his freshman year at Yale and LOVING it all! My younger 3 girls each had their own happy times though my middle daughter (grade 7) also had some challenges with her peers. As the Washington Township District Anti-Bullying Coordinator, I am well-versed in the language of the "bully." I am very sensitive to 'our kids' feelings and interpretation of what is being said or done to them. For our students I know that their 'perception is reality.' I am an advocate for any student who feels uncomfortable with the language or actions of another. Please know that this perspective is born not just of my extensive training but also of living the experience with my own children.

Than being said, it is vital to remember that every push, shove and tease does not equate to bullying. Again, I understand that this is a sensitive topic when it comes to our own children. However, I invite you to explore the difference between bullying and conflict. Generally, conflict involves antagonism among 2 or more individuals. Two people can have a conflict, a disagreement or a fight, but bullying occurs when there is a 'power imbalance' and one child has a hard time defending him/herself (www.stopbullyingnow.hrsa.gov.) Bullying is a form of victimization, and should not be confused with childhood conflict.

It is 'normal' for peer conflict to occur. Students benefit in the long term from some conflict in their lives. They begin to understand their own feelings, become empathetic toward others, develop appropriate responses to difficult situations, work on anger management, and learn proper behavioral responses.

Fast forward to your child's future - wouldn't you hope that they have the skills to tolerate diversity, manage opinions that differ from their own and handle adult peer competition and conflict? The time is now, when our children are young, to help them develop these essential life skills. I am here to help our children develop skills of self-advocacy, increase personal self-esteem and teach healthy, appropriate social responses in a safe, controlled environment.

Washington Township School District does not tolerate any behavior that is mean intentioned, even when it is not formally considered bullying. Respect for all is the theme of every character education lesson, small group activity and individual counseling session. This is reinforced in many ways by school staff and administration. We continue to practice the "golden rule" where we treat others as we wish to be treated - students and staff are encouraged to treat all with dignity and respect.

When our students return to school in January, our Community of Character trait will focus on TOLERANCE followed by a focus on DIVERSITY in February. Please review the Character Calendar with your children as there are daily reminders for you and yours to read together.

I wish you and your family a very Happy, Healthy New Year! I am always available to speak with you about concerns or positive milestones. If you have a schedule that does not permit you to contact me during the 'business/school day' let me know and I will be happy to provide my cell number.
