All grade levels have two days of Language Arts Literacy testing followed by two days of Mathematics testing. Only 4th grade will be tested in science on day five.

Attendance on these days is very important! Please try to reschedule any appointments that are not critical so that your child will be in school. In addition it is vital that your child arrive to school on time. They will not be permitted to enter the classroom once the test has begun.

Reminder for All Parents from the School Nurses

When you take your child to the Doctor or Emergency Room for immunizations, physicals, stitches, broken bones, surgery, etc., *please provide documentation for the School Nurse.* This should indicate date and name of immunization(s), diagnosis of injury, illness, and gym status as necessary. Gym/Physical activity restriction notes should indicate participation level (if any) and date student may return to all activities without restrictions. This ensures maintenance of your child's optimal health during school and keeps health records current.

Now that we are experiencing warmer weather, please remember to apply sunscreen to your child before they come to school. Children may not carry sunscreen on their person to school, and it cannot be applied by staff members at school.

In preparation for next school year, if your child will require medications for the 2014/2015 school year, visit the district's Health Office webpage and download the appropriate forms to be completed by your child's physician. Links are provided on the left hand side of the webpage for the appropriate forms (ie, asthma, food/insect allergy, diabetes management, seizure management, and all other medications, including over the counter medications). Under Your Skin

Mrs. Melhem's class just finished their health chapter entitled Personal Health. The chapter focused on personal care, dental hygiene, caring for your eyes, ears and skin. Spring is the season where we are finally able to spend quality time in the outdoors. Because of this additional time in the sun, we must have extra skin-care protection. What better mystery guest could our class have this month than Tess Errickson's mother, Dr. Carla Errickson, Dermatologist. Dr. Errickson discussed many topics related to skin care. Her presentation generated many questions from the students about poison ivy.

Dr. Errickson demonstrated to our students what happens to our skin on the cellular level to cause a poison ivy rash. One student was chosen to be "Hans", the Langerhans cell. Hans' job was to bring the poison ivy molecule to the nearest lymph node and find the T-cell that reacts to that molecule. To help the students understand what happens in the lymph node, several students stood in a group holding



different items. Hans was then blindfolded and given the challenge of matching those items by the sense of feel. Once the match was found the cell was then activated and copies of itself were made. The copy, represented by a student, was the activated T-cell (paper plates with smiley faces on them). Hans and the copies then traveled to the skin and "attacked" the poison ivy oil.

The Port Colden Poetry Club had the great honor of attending a poetry class at Warren County Community College on April 8th. The class was taught by Professor B.J. Ward, a former Washington Township student and father of one of the poetry club members. The college students were asked to write kid-friendly poems that they shared with our first graders. Counselor's Corner (Continued)

Washington Township School District will be administering New Jersey ASK tests from May 12th—16th for grades 3 - 6. It is important to understand that even students who are very well prepared academically may experience pre-test anxiety. Encourage your child to relax and look at the test as a chance to show what they have learned (and not to focus on what they don't know.) I have found that nervous feelings go away once the actual testing begins; often it is the anticipation and build up that is the hardest part. If you know that your child is prone to test anxiety, please call me ahead of time and I'll be happy to work with him/her to ease their mind - and yours!

A few pre-test tips include:

- Keep your child's routine very similar to 'normal' because consistency is important;
- Don't make any major changes during test week. Though well intentioned a 'special' breakfast is not the way to go during test week. Stick with what works a mix of carbs and protein is ideal (toast, eggs, low sugar cereal) throw some fruit in the mix and your child is good to go;
- It is worth repeating do not hesitate to contact me or your child's teacher if you feel your child would benefit from extra support during testing; and
- Take every opportunity to build your child's self esteem when they feel good about themselves they will be more positive in general.

2014-2015 Budget Message

The school budget reflects our educational program in dollars. It is the basis for every phase of the district's operation - personnel, curriculum, buildings, instructional materials, equipment, transportation, after-school activities, etc. We face the same challenges that school districts across the state face — a 2% cap, enrollment changes, increases in health insurance premiums, utilities, textbooks and supplies, unfunded state mandates, and facilities maintenance.

The budget was carefully scrutinized for efficiency and effectiveness. All expenditures, existing and new, were carefully considered and any possible savings were explored. Once the budget is approved by the county, on behalf of the state, and adopted by the Board of Education, the total amount budgeted for the year is set. However, since budget development begins months before it is implemented, there is some flexibility to permit line-item transfers during the year to meet changing circumstances and needs.

The 2014-2015 budget provides funding to address the district's challenges and meet our goals. As the budget is developed we look toward the future to safeguard our ability to consistently, responsibly and sustainably serve our students and community.

The primary sources of funding for our school budget are local tax (65.7%), state aid (30.2%), federal aid (2.7%). The remaining money (1.4%) comes from extraordinary aid, shared services and interest.

Through careful planning and budgeting, the district has been able to fund many improvements to our buildings without going to the voters for additional funds. In 2014-2015 we will be withdrawing \$205,500 from our capital reserve account to fund a roofing project at Brass Castle School. The district remains debt-free with no outstanding bonds supported by taxes.

The district is receiving an additional \$9,900 in state aid this year. While it is helpful and appreciated to have an increase, we need to note that this year's state aid of \$2,633,725 is \$318,102 less than the amount received in 2008-2009.

The tax levy required to fund the 2014-2015 budget is within the state's 2% tax cap regulations and guidelines. The overall increase to the tax levy will be \$182,755.

With the current total assessed value of properties in Washington Township, the 2014-2015 budget will raise the tax levy by 2.7¢ per \$100 assessed value or about \$68 a year on the average Washington Township home.

The 2014-2015 budget maintains all existing programming and supports the district's goals. What is new in the 2014-2015 budget?

- Expand Kindergarten to a full-day program.
- ✓ Building Security provide a full-time school security officer (SRO) (was not in 2013-14 budget).
- ✓ Reading Series partial implementation of new reading series in grades K-2.
- PARCC technology upgrades needed for implementation of New Jersey Department of Education's new assessment tool – (Partnership for the Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers).
- Contractual salary increases and projected 9% increase to medical insurance premiums.

Tax Rates — What does 1¢ Mean?

Tax rates are based on the total assessed E value of the municipality. In 2014, for y Washington Township, this value is \$680,267,141. This means for the 2014-2015 budget, each 1¢ on the tax rate equals \$68,026.71

Enrollment is declining — Why are taxes increasing? Enrollment has declined 22.6% since the 2000-2001 school year. The cumulative inflation rate for the same period of time is 32.6%. Although per pupil state aid has increased, it has not kept up with inflation. For the 2014-2015 school year, we will receive \$4,762 per pupil in state aid. When we adjust for inflation, this is \$327 less per pupil than our 2000-2001 state aid.

In addition to the tax levy for the elementary school, homeowners also pay taxes to support the Warren Hills Regional School District, Warren County, and the municipally. Between 1997 and 2013, the percent of your total tax that supports the elementary school has gone from 32.5% down to 25.1%
