General Education Inclusive Preschool Program

The Washington Township School District offers a General Education Inclusive Preschool program at the Brass Castle School. The program is open to all four-year-old children who reside in Washington Township, Warren County. The child must be four (4) years old by October 1st and not age eligible for kindergarten.

The class is taught by a certified teacher and supported with highly qualified paraprofessionals. This program provides an inclusive educational environment for preschool children that is aligned with the Preschool Teaching and Learning Expectations, and includes both general education and special needs preschool children.

The preschool program will take place during the afternoon session. The afternoon session hours are from 12:40pm -3:20pm. The preschool program follows the Washington Township School District calendar. There is no tuition cost for this program, but transportation to and from the program is the responsibility of the parent/guardian.

Applications for this program can be found on the Washington Township School District website, www.washtwpsd.org or by contacting the Washington Township School District Child Study Team at 908-689-1188 x 3610. Applications for the 2016-17 school year are now being accepted. Applications for the 2016-17 school year will be accepted until May 13, 2016. A limited number of openings are available for this program. In the event that the district receives more applications than students can be placed in the program a lottery system will be utilized to select students into the program. The lottery for selection into the General Education Inclusive Preschool will occur on Wednesday, June 29, 2016 at 10:00am. The lottery will take place in the library of the Brass Castle School. In the event that the date for the lottery drawing needs to be changed, all applicants will be notified.

Counselor's Corner October 2015 - RESPECT

Our school community is one where kindness and nurturing hearts live in our classrooms and on our sports fields. When we receive sad news about one of our own, it affects us as part of the greater Washinglacksquare ton Township community. Recently we experienced collective sadness and disbelief over the loss of one of lacksquareour high school students. Please know that we have provided support to all our children and staff mem- ${
m f l}$ bers during this very trying time. Our children know that they are safe here and that they always have ${
m f l}$ someone to listen to their thoughts, fears and concerns.

For parents, it is important to remember that children will look to you to help them cope with loss. When speaking with our young ones about death it is good to be respectful of developmental age.

Our youngest children in pre-school through age 8 may see death as 'magical.' They think that someone can come back, they can write them letters or they make bargains. 'if I'm really, really good then they will come back.'

Our children ages 9-11 start to see death as being more real though it is something that happens to someone else. Reactions can come in bursts, fine one minute, questioning the next - lots and lots of questions.

Early middle school children are very clear that death is a final event. Acting out, emotional outbursts, anger and denial are common. They may focus on the greater meaning of life and the 'why' questions.

For children and adults alike, grief is a process not an event. There is no predictable or 'right' way to grieve. Allow yourself and your children time to be sad before moving towards healing.

Keeping schedules similar to 'normal' is important. If you go to football practice every Monday – stick [with the schedule. Our children will feel safer when their routines are consistently followed especially after a traumatic event.

With October being the Month of Respect, we quietly acknowledge our respect for others and the fragility of life. Live each day with joy and simply... Be Kind.
