Building Bridges!



Mrs. Page's class studied different bridges and analyzed how they were built and what made them strong. The class found that shorter pieces of material were harder to bend than longer pieces, and they also found that triangles, diagonals, and Xs were strong shapes that were used in many of the bridges they observed. Students then worked in groups to design and build a bridge made of straws, tape, and rubber bands. As a class, the bridges were tested to see how much weight they could hold. The class found that all the bridges were able to hold at least 400g and one heavy dictionary, and some bridges were able to hold even more!

Child's Play Theatre Assembly

A tradition in our district is the arrival of the Child's Play Theatre from Chicago. What makes this tradition so special to our students is that the scripts used for the acts are actual writing pieces that our students submit in January. Three writing pieces are selected from each school and the students find out if they move from "writer" to "scriptwriter" status on the day of the performance. It is great fun for students and staff to see our young writers' work come alive on stage!

STEM: Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics

Mrs. Peterson and Mrs. Mitch's 5th grade class recently completed a STEM activity utilizing simple machines. This problem-based learning activity required the students to use everyday items to construct a model pulley system that could be used to keep hungry bears away from food while on a camping trip. The students each designed a pulley system on their own, and then combined into small groups where they compared the pros and cons of each system. This data was used to create a group pulley system. After many trials and errors, the groups designed a presentation to demonstrate their pulley systems to their classmates. The students demonstrated patience and perseverance as they planned and problem-solved together. Perhaps if you are planning a camping trip in the near future, you could ask a 5th grader from 5P/M for some advice on keeping your food safe.



Michael Jordan: Can you believe Jordan was CUT from his high school basketball team? This failure motivated him to work harder and look where he is today
