Study Island Home Study Program Continues

We are pleased to announce that we are able to continue to offer our students the benefit of the Study Island program. Study Island is completely web-based, which allows students to access the program from any computer with an Internet connection using a web browser.

Study Island lessons are based on the Common Core Curriculum Standards in both Mathematics and Reading. The program is divided into sections based on subject. Each section is made up of 15 to 30 topics, with each topic containing about 20 to 30 questions. Topics are accompanied by a lesson, which contains a brief overview of the material covered in that topic. Students in Grade 3 through Grade 6 are encouraged to go to www.studyisland.com, select a subject area, take the pre-test, and work on the various activities available. Parents will be provided with subscription packets at Back to School Night, which will include login information for Study Island. In addition to reviewing your contact information, please send a note to school if your child's afterschool arrangements will be modified. If you have any questions or concerns, please contact your child's school.



August 31st marked the retirement of our superintendent, Roger Jinks, who has served the Washington Township School District for the past seven years.



Mr. Jinks' career in the field of education spans a total of 43 years. He began his career as a music teacher in 1971 at Sts. Philips and James High School (which converted to Phillipsburg Catholic the following year). Mr. Jinks joined Clinton Public Schools in 1980 and began his administrative career there. In 1999 Mr. Jinks' career path led him to Franklin Township where he served as the Chief School Administrator until December 2006. We here at Washington Township were fortunate to have Mr. Jinks come into district in January 2007 where he has finished out his distinguished career as our superintendent.

We acknowledge Mr. Jinks for his outstanding leadership while in district, but all of us who worked with Roger will remember most of all his love for children. He not only made a difference for students at an administrative level, but also engaged with our students on a daily basis. It did not sur-

prise any staff member to find Mr. Jinks sitting on the floor interacting with one of our early elementary students or alongside our older students reading a book to them, inquiring about the day's science experiment or technology project. On other occasions, he would surprise students by dressing up in the fireman's outfit for the Fire Safety Program or as Mr. Potato Head for the PTA Fall Party days, join in musical events playing the piano or drums, or lead a group of anxious incoming kindergarteners and parents through a song/ dance during their orientation. Whatever the occasion, Mr. Jinks always put children first and valued their individuality.



We traditionally interview our retirees before leaving us, and we thought it would be fun to share those same topics we asked Mr. Jinks:

Where did you go to school? Graduate of Trenton State College - BS in Elementary Education; Minor in music education; Master's Degree East Stroudsburg University

Family: Wife, Kathleen (who is a retired school superintendent); children - Maria, chiropractor; Kathleen, high school mathematics teacher; and Roger, Jr. - Superintendent of Hamburg School District; and four adored grandchildren.

The best thing about being a superintendent: "Whenever I was experiencing a problem or a unique challenge, I could leave my office and go to a classroom to witness extraordinary things happening. Enthusiastic teachers delivering material in new and exciting ways while students would respond with wide-eyed interest to the new information or the new activity. I would leave the school refreshed and renewed - ready to take on any issue, regardless of its difficulty."



Career advice: "As you look forward to your career choices, think about things that you are passionate about. If you are lucky enough to land in a career doing something that you love - you will never work a day in your life. I was fortunate in that way."

Although we sadly say goodbye and thank you to Mr. Jinks, we also wish him the best in his retirement. He plans to spend time with his family, train for a half-marathon and pursue his musical interests. Back-to-School Nights

Cell Phone - Reminder

Children may, with parent/ guardian's permission, bring their cell phone to school. Pupils may not, however, have the cellular phone activated when on school property, while on the school bus or while attending a school function such as a concert, play and/ or dance.

While on school property all cell phones must be safely stored in their backpack in their homeroom. Parents may, in an emergency, contact their child through the school's main office. Students may also, under extenuating circumstances, ask their teacher for permission to go to the office to call their parent(s).

Highly Qualified Notification

As per the United States Department of Education's No Child Left Behind Law of 2002, school districts must notify parents of the highly qualified status of all teaching staff members. The law requires that all schools receiving Title 1 funds must inform parents of their right to ask schools about the qualifications of their child's teachers. Our school receives Title 1 funding and we are happy to share this information with you.

We believe that nothing is more important to your child's education at school than having a wellprepared and highly qualified teacher. The law requires that all teachers must meet a specific legal definition of "highly qualified" in order to teach in schools and that definition has three parts:

1. at least a bachelor's degree from a regionally accredited institution of higher education;

- 2. that the teacher be fully licensed and certified; and
- 3. that they demonstrate expertise in their field.

We are pleased to report once again that all teaching staff members meet the "highly qualified" standard established by the New Jersey Department of Education.

Birthday Invitations / Treats

Parents are reminded that invitations to home birthday parties may be distributed in school, but they need to be distributed as follows with no exceptions: the entire class, all boys or all girls. Parents should also present the birthday invitations to the teachers for distribution.



If you would like to have your child celebrate his/her birthday in school by having a small treat for their classmates, please check with the classroom teacher a minimum of 2 days prior regarding any allergy/ dietary concerns there may be in the classroom. The treat needs to be dropped off in the main office in the morning. Parents are reminded that all treats should be easily distributed, such as a cup-cake or cookie. Teachers are not permitted to cut up "sheet cakes" nor will they distribute frozen treats, such as ice cream. We do not have the refrigeration space required to store them. And finally, please do not send in "birthday-bag treats" for your child's classmates; it is gracious of a parent to do that, but we must remember all families do not have the resources to provide each child with such a gift.

School Fire / Emergency Drills

General Assembly Bill 3002, enacted on January 11, 2010, requires districts to hold 1 fire drill and 1 emergency drill per month. Emergency drills must include the following: lockdown, bomb treat, evacuation (non-fire) and active shooter. As in the past, we will continue to have the police and other first-responders visit our schools during these drills to observe and provide feedback. The purpose of this legislation is to practice these emergency drills so that schools are prepared to respond to these types of emergencies. It is important that parents understand the guidelines, which we must adhere to regarding these drills.

When these emergency drills are being held we will no longer announce them as drills. The Warren County Prosecutor's Office issued guidance regarding the language used when drills are practiced. We are to simply announce, in clear talk, "Lockdown - the school is now in lockdown". It is their view that every drill should be "conducted as close to the actual situation as possible". Therefore, we will no longer announce a "lockdown drill" but simply say, "Lockdown - the school is now in lockdown."

With regard to the notification of our parents, we will not notify parents that drills have occurred. We will, however, notify parents about actual events, once directed by the police department.
